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. . . From the President

I would like to ask your indulgence as I reflect on previous reports and my time as President in this report. I have discussed with you before many of the changes and challenges your Association has met during the past three years. Your board members have embraced these and I believe your Association is much stronger as a result.

Briefly to recap a few, it was necessary to become more independent and in order to accomplish this, it was obvious to your board members that we needed a staff person to oversee and lead the day to day business of the Association. We were blessed there was a tremendously qualified and talented person who was agreeable to stepping into the role of Executive Director and moving forward from day one. Thank you Tamara!

It quickly became obvious that our bookkeeping system, computers and software were in dire need of updating which resulted in much of the information needing to be manually entered into the new system, which was a very time consuming and frustrating process. We are also very fortunate to have an outstanding person who undertook this task. Thank you Donna!

One area we are very proud of is opportunities we have been able to offer districts through various programs. The conservation education and outreach program (555 program) allows each district to recover substantial funds targeted to their local priorities. The travel scholarship program provides assistance with travel to regional and national meetings. Soil health workshops have been held across the state and more are in planning stages. I am of the belief that this is possibly the first time your Association has been able to offer financial support directly to districts. These programs are the result of contracts the Association has negotiated with Texas NRCS leadership who are strong proponents of locally led conservation efforts for which we offer our sincerest thanks.

We certainly encourage you to take advantage of these.

One legislative activity in particular which has come to fruition since our last meeting is passage of the 2018 Farm Bill. We were fortunate to have a good friend in the legislature who served as chairman of the House Agriculture Committee allowing us to develop meaningful dialog during the course of the farm bill process. We worked closely with him and NACD, our national organization, to accomplish this. We feel that there are many areas addressed in this farm bill which are important for conservation in Texas and can be traced back to these conversations.

Once again, I will remind you that even though your board members and staff work diligently to see that your wishes are conveyed to appropriate officials, none has the same effect as personally contacting your representatives. Please do not underestimate the voice you have as a constituent!

This meeting of conservation district directors marks the end of the time I am eligible to serve as your president. I would like to thank you for the trust you have placed in me over the past three years. I have certainly been honored to have represented you in this capacity. I would like to offer my most sincere thanks to your Association board members and staff I have been privileged to work and become friends with during my tenure. These are such incredible people and are absolutely committed to representing you. Please extend your thanks to them as well!

. . . A Year in Review

This past year has been very busy for the Association. We kicked off 2019 in a big way as host state for the February 2-6 NACD Annual Meeting, welcoming 1,000 conservation leaders from across the nation and U.S. territories to San Antonio, Texas. In addition to our warm hospitality, behind-the-scenes work included securing speakers, setting up tours and other host state events. Planning and work for this major conference actually began last May, however, we are always happy to show off our great state!

Legislative

The Board traveled to Washington, D.C. in March to participate in the annual NACD Legislative Fly-in and spent two days on Capitol Hill, meeting with members of the Texas Delegation. They addressed funding for conservation programs, Farm Bill implementa-

tion, carrizo cane eradication and also provided general conservation information for each congressional district. They met with approximately 20 members in D.C. and also had the opportunity to visit with NRCS leadership and network with conservation leaders from other states.

Immediately upon their return, the Board traveled to Austin for Conservation Day at the Capitol. District Directors, along with Association Board members, met with state senators and representatives. The day's primary focus involved funding for our various conservation programs. The Association partnered with TCAWS to host the annual event.

Throughout the legislative session, ATSWCD Executive Director Tamara Daniel also represents the Association at weekly meetings of the Texas Ag Council to network with other ag organizations across Texas on priority issues.

Soil Health

We continue to grow this important outreach program, with funding made possible through an agreement with NRCS. We hosted three 2-day events this year in Palestine, Amarillo and Victoria. All facilities were filled to capacity, and more than 400 people attended the event in Ama-

rillo. We are headed west for the next workshop, to be held in Sweetwater. These educational courses include field tours, scientific research and speakers, as well as producers who provide the "boots on the ground" perspective. Each of these informative Soil Health Workshops represents months of advance planning.



Partnership Programs

The Association co-sponsors several events with the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, including the Awards Program, the District Director/Employee Leadership Development Workshop and the FFA Soil Stewardship Speaking Contest. ATSWCD Board members and the Executive Director served as judges for the speaking contest and presented the winners.

Board members and the Executive Director attend a wide variety of other meetings throughout the year, including the NACD South Central Region meeting held every summer. They attend as many area association meetings as possible and and also attend regular Ag Council meetings outside the legislative session, State Technical Committee meetings and many more as the need arises.

Agreements

The Association currently has three agreements with NRCS. Two of the agreements provide direct benefits to conservation districts.

The Travel Scholarship provides funding to help pay for directors to attend regional or national meetings. In 2019, 21 directors attended the NACD meeting in San Antonio under the Travel

Scholarship Program. The Association was able to return more than \$27,000 to member districts to assist in covering travel expenses.

The 555 Program is in its second year and participation continues to grow. Through three quarters in FY19 (3rd quarter pending), the chart below details payments to districts by area:
